Primary sources on Indian-English Contact in England and New England:

William Bradford, *Of Plymouth Plantation, 1620-1647*. Of the many modern editions, the handiest is Samuel Eliot Morison's of 1952 (Modern Library).

Charles H. Lincoln, ed., *Narratives of the Indian Wars, 1675-1699* (1913; reprinted Barnes and Noble, 1952).

Charles Orr, ed., *The History of the Pequot War* (AMS Press, 1980). Four narratives.

James Rosier, *A True Relation of the Most Prosperous Voyage Made this Present Yeere 1605* . . . (London, 1605). The only extensive account of captive Indians in 17th century England. The best modern edition, edited by David and Alison Quinn, is in *The English New England Voyages, 1602-1608* (Hakluyt Society, 1983).

Mary Rowlandson, *The Sovereignty and Goodness of God* (Cambridge, Mass., 1682). The best modern edition is Neal Salisbury's (Bedford Books, 1997).

Thomas Morton, *New English Canaan* (Amsterdam, 1637; reprinted Arno Press, 1972).

Alden T. Vaughan and Edward W. Clark, eds. *Puritans among the Indians: Accounts of Captivity and Redemption, 1676-1724* (Harvard University Press, 1981). Eight narratives.

Roger Williams, *A Key into the Language of America* (London, 1643). A modern edition was edited by John J. Teunissen and Evelyn J. Hinz (Wayne State University Press, 1973).

William Wood, *New Englands Prospect* (London, 1634). There are several modern editions, including my own, with annotations (University of Massachusetts Press, 1977).
